

WHY DO I BELONG TO THE CATHOLIC WOMEN'S LEAGUE OF CANADA?

As immigrants from England in 1967, Bryan and I and our two daughters spent four and a



half years in Crawford Bay. When Bryan transferred to teach at Prince Charles Secondary School, Cataldina Salviulo, a friend from Gray Creek, who was now Father Morelli's housekeeper, invited me to join her at a CWL meeting in the Spring of 1972. I have served in various positions but mostly as secretary and was President from 1984-1986. In 1994 I became Diocesan Secretary, much to the surprise of my husband when he attended the Installation Mass that evening! In 2004 I agreed to be secretary for the new Diocesan President, our fellow parishioner Joyce Slattery, with Marion Nygren serving as treasurer. Those were fun years, travelling together to various councils for retreats, workshops and conventions. What are the benefits of belonging to CWL? Firstly friendship. Most of my closest friends are fellow members. Secondly, an increase in Spirituality. As parish secretary/bookkeeper for 30 years I often attended weekday Mass and membership in the CWL reinforced the reality that Mass is not just a weekend privilege but a daily blessing available to all. While working and raising 4 children I always found time to attend the CWL meetings and activities because I enjoyed them.



So why do I still belong? As members of a large national organization, we are asked to grow in faith and to witness to the love of God through ministry and service. In our parish CWL councils we are encouraged to formulate resolutions which are then forwarded to the Diocesan, Provincial and National CWL Conventions and, if adopted, are further presented to Federal and Provincial Governments. Resolutions submitted from an organization of 70,000 women carry weight and may be passed into law.

In our parish we continue to serve our parishioners by hosting funeral lunches and social events which provide an opportunity to join with like minded ladies for companionship and particularly with regular meetings to

strengthen our faith life. I urge all ladies to attend at least one meeting to see for yourself what we are all about. We meet every second Wednesday at 10 am from September to June. If you join us but are unable to attend meetings regularly perhaps you will pray for us, as we work for God and Canada under the guidance of Our Lady of Good Counsel.

My Dear Parishioners,

Peace be with you all!

There has been unusually cold weather for this time of the year over the past few days. There was a power outage for a couple of hours and in some areas it lasted almost for two days, caused by the terrible wind on Tuesday. I hear that the weather is extremely cold right now in our town. I hope that by this weekend the weather will be a bit warmer.

Here, I would like to share with you an event that happened yesterday. As the Mass was over, I was busy arranging the Mass-Kit to take with me to Crestview for the service. One of the weekly attendants introduced a guy to me who wanted to talk to me. We are familiar with the saying "the first impression is the best impression." The way the guy entered through the exit door, coming to meet me near the altar, caused me to feel a negative impression towards him. I unwillingly said that I would meet him outside the Church. Once I set up the Mass-kit, I came out and was looking for him. As I could not find him, I asked Ralph and he said that the guy was around here. It was cold enough to be out, I thought that he would be somewhere in his car in the parking lot. Finally, I got hold of him, I went near to his car and asked what brought him here? He said that he wanted to talk to me for a while. I was in a hurry to do the Covid test before I went to the care home and I had scheduled to visit Ron prior to that, I actually wanted to avoid talking to this person. I responded to him in an uncharitable way by telling him to go to the office and meet Helen. My response was not kind and he said that he would take care of himself.

As I was opening the door just wanting to escape from the cold and getting in, one thought struck me: oh..., no..., it was not the right way to treat a person! I could have been more kind! I did not know for what reason he was there, an urgent need or some desperate situation? Feeling guilty, I initiated Covid testing and I was waiting to hear some strange voice from the office. There I heard a new voice after a few minutes, which I was expecting. He got stuck in Creston with low fuel in his vehicle and was there to get some help for gas money to travel further. I made sure that it was him, I inquired about his need which relieved me a bit from my guilty conscience.

We have recently begun Lent which is the season of grace and a time to encounter our Lord in our fellow brethren and in Mother Nature. I know that most of you volunteer at Gleaners, Food Bank, TAPS, Soup-Kitchen, and in other community-based centers. Just to let you know that whatever you do in the community, it is well recognized by our seniors and those in need and highly appreciated.

Let the Lenten principles: **Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving** enhance our personal relationship with our Lord which may lead us to reach out to the needy. Though you have your own Lenten observances to follow, I would like to suggest one thing to do during this Lent: **visiting the sick and the elderly if possible.** I know you that **your visit or at least a phone call** would bring healing and joy to them.



I also encourage you to find some time to come to Church for Adoration on Fridays in Lent. Visiting the Blessed Sacrament is greatly recommended in Lent. Being with the Lord silently brings us closer to Jesus and it is a huge blessing to us, to family, and to our town and in a greater sense to the whole world when we offer a prayer.

I conclude with today's Canticle of Zechariah "When you meet those who are in need of clothing, do not turn away from them, for they are your brethren. Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your good deeds shall go before you."

The man says, "I have two brothers who have moved away to different countries. We promised each other that we would always order an extra two beers whenever we drank as a way of keeping up the family bond."


